Narrawilly proggy Ruggers

This wall hanging inspired by embroidery on a childs dress and the chocolates my grandson gave me for Christmas. I used recycled fabrics, velvet, taffeta, organza, T shirt, wool, and wool yarn, buttons, beads, chocolate papers, and glitzy braid.

RECIPE

FROM Judi Tompkins Queensland

Grandma Tompkins Amazing Chocolate chip Fig or Date Cake.

1 cup hot water

2 ½ cups chopped dried figs or dates

1 teaspoon baking soda mix together and let cool

1 cup sugar2 eggs1 ¼ cups SR flour¼ teaspoon salt1 Tablespoon Cocoa

1 1/2 cups chocolate chips

1cup coarsely chopped walnuts

Cream butter and sugar, beat in eggs one at a time, add fig or date mixture. Sift together flour salt and cocoa, add and mix well. Pour into greased ($13 \times 9 \times 2$) cake pan. Sprinkle top with chocolate chips and nuts. Bake in 350 F oven for 30- 35 minutes.



Note from Judi – I make this with chopped figs or even dried apricots. Nice change for those who do not like the sweetness of dates.

CANADA - Nova scotia

A report by Cathy Komourdjian Trip of Life Time: Australia and New Zealand

A fabulous opportunity arose in 2014, a fibre art cruise in 2016: four nights in Sydney, two nights Mollymook (Milton) to rug hook with proggy artist and spinner Miriam Miller. So I booked this right away. I then added two nights in Cairns, and two nights in Uluru (the red centre).

I am driven by art and culture and very curious about how the world was populated and who ended up where. This was a double opportunity to explore Aboriginal and the Maori culture and art.

Top pick of the trip for me was the fibre art experience with Miriam Miller and her proggy/hookey circle...Mollymook is 3.5 hours south of Sydney, along very pastoral, lush, tropical tree lined route, water views on left a very curvy highway. This was an opportunity to view the country side up close rather than not from the vantage point of the aircraft window. We stayed at the very luxurious Bannisters by the Sea with views of Narrawallee beach. Jacqui and Miriam picked us up and took us on a brief tour. Then we (Betty, Cindy and I) were hosted to a progressive dinner hosted by Miriam's' hooky circle: we were treated royally to a progressive dinner featuring a: heritage home, a country bungalow and an ultramodern new build. Front and centre in all these homes were the fibre art rugs. I was blown away by the open heartedness and welcoming spirit extended to three Nova Scotia's: CFA (come from a ways).

The next day Jacqui picked us up and took us to Miriam's studio at Narrawilly farm. Beautiful landscape garden, (coming from -10 in Canada) and lots of gorgeous flowers. Wow such a rich coloured canvas, my eyes did not know what to take IN. the country scenery and oh yes the fabulous house on the hill that blended into the great views.

A great day spent hooking and meeting Miriam's circle, learning proggy and being given the tools to make it easier .Also Miriam very generously also gave us copies of her book to help promote the art. Brief trip to watch the milking with borrow foot gear. (I was raised on two hundred acre farm outside of Uxbridge Ontario). I'm always interested in processes.

Miriam and Jacqui treated us to a tour of the surrounding area culminating in a meet and greet with Kangaroos--- what a treat!! .Then dinner fish and chips to die for Miriam's' treat. The whole two days were just amazing. Thank-you for having us these memories will last a life time.



Also I was able to add two excursions to the Australia leg of the adventure- Great Barrier Reef and Uluru and Betty joined me.

Uluru(the red centre) home of the Anangu was just the most spiritually uplifting experience for me --, brought up on —Flying doctor stories and education on the air — to be in the out back in the moment- very fulfilling. The aboriginals have been here in excess of 30,000 years, treat this area as; grocery, department store and pharmacy. Rotational burning refurbishes the land. Their language and history has been handed down in their oral traditions, drawing in the sand (now on canvas) and cave art. Did sunrise tour with base walk and visited the cave drawings, and then took part in the Sounds of silence dinner with the didgeridoo in the back ground.

Tour of the Great Barrier Reef with Reef Magic, last Australian owned outfit, was amazing. We had great day on the reef fabulous food and lots of time to scuba dive. Complex had both a glass bottom and submersible boats- saw coral- bleached and decolonized sponges and a sea turtle and lots of brilliant fish.

The cruise was great we were treated to fabulous foods; entertainment and a very clean well run ship. There was an Epic Ice show on board. We had a room to hook in on the days at sea .All my excursions were to learn about the indigenous people or flora and fauna. Maori culture about 7000 years – triangle of population: Easter Island, Hawaii and New Zealand – as population expanded and they need new food sources – they followed the migrating birds- learned the constellations and followed cloud formations that indicated land mass. Gave me a lot to think about and to read up on. Their language is the tattoos that are on their bodies and thru spoken tradition.

I finally gave in, And guess where Elaine lives? She lives in Malaysia. I have her e-mail and phone # too. It is so amazing the people you meet because of this love of rug hooking. It almost seems magic at times. So Miriam your book went to Malaysia and Elaine is newly retired and there wasn't any other rug hookers in her area and she said she would like to get rug hooking known in her area. I have not heard from her yet, but hope she will write sometime soon.
