My Story Rug depicts through HOPE and HARD WORK Struggling Readers can learn to read. I am a struggling reader. I repeated grades 2 and 5. My family, especially my mother and good teachers, especially Mrs. Jackson gave me HOPE. I can remember my mother saying, "Mary you are not stupid." I can remember my grade 6 teacher Mrs. Jackson telling my mother the paragraph she would ask me to read the following day in class. Mom and I worked on that paragraph the night before and I was able to read it quite well the following day. Reading a paragraph to my class without struggling or missing most of the words gave me hope. I was 12 years old before I really believed I could learn to read. With HOPE and HARD WORK I graduated from high school, earned a B.A., B.Ed., and Masters in Special Education. Some students (like me) learn to read later than others. Students reading 2 or more grades below the grade, they are in need: positive reinforcement and to attend more classes that focus on learning to read and ones they can do well in such as: Art, Music, Physical Education and Computer Science. Providing these accommodations will prove struggling readers can learn to read.

NEW SOUTH WALES -Braidwood



tables. We sell items and equipment and I make hooking and progging tools which are sold for Heather's Rug Aid funds. It lasts for four days and can be exhausting but great fun!










NEW SOUTH WALES - MILTON SHOW -

ENGLAND — YORKSHIRE – Leslie Ritchie

Heather and I moved to Reeth a village in the Yorkshire Dales in 1971 three years after we were married. I was a junior engineer in the Merchant Navy. In those days the tours away from home were for many months, my longest trip was 18 months. This amount of time away from home left Heather on her own with our daughter Vicky, when I say on her own, not for long! She soon integrated into country life in a farming community.

Our home had stone slag floors, which in winter were very cold to walk on. Heather became great friends with a lady called Hanna Place, who was born and brought up in Reeth. This is when my life changed when she said to Heather you need rugs on these here floors lass; I will show you how to make them. So Heather started making rugs and I started making the tools for her, as they could not be bought, those that were around had been handmade and quite crude. I had access to a metal lathe on my ship and designed the hook shanks. My first handles were made out of the only available wood on board ship, broom shanks! Not the best wood in the world, I had to cease making them as the crew on board was complaining of backache having to sweep the decks with brooms that only had a 12-inch shank!

As time went on, Heather was perfecting her rugs and required more specialized tools which I started to make for her in exotic wood handles, by this time she was teaching across the UK and my hook sales was confined here. Heather was invited to teach with Cilla Cameron at Green Mountain Rug School in America and it was there that my hooks were introduced. My hook sales have grown in the States over the years and I have now taken on a partner Ken who is a skilled turner and marine engineer to keep up with the demand.


'Proggy and Hooky Rugs'
