

Peggys Cove Lighthouse





. Peggy's Cove Lighthouse is one of the great tourist attractions in Nova Scotia. However people don't realize how dangerous the rocks are there. There is always a chance of a rogue wave sweeping people off those rocks. It doesn't matter how many signs the government put up warning of the hazard, people still go too close to the water. Many people have been lost and drowned there

I decided to do a mat depicting these waves. At first, I thought I could put in a rescue but the rug would have to be a lot larger to show this, so I just stuck to doing the lighthouse and water around it with high waves and surf. I think the dimensions are 27 inches by 36 inches or pretty close to that. I dyed my own wool but used some recycled. I also bought some wool from Moose River Studio (where you met me and the group I hook with). I used this piece as the lighter bottom part of the sky on the right. I almost always hook in 3 cut wool strips but I think there are some 4 cut strips also. Toni

When Jacqui and I were travelling I spent a day with the Moose River Studio Rug makers in Nova Scotia. Very cold and windy outside but not aware of it inside. I took many photos. and one I took was Toni's nearly finished lighthouse. It was extremely finely and exquisitely hooked and now here is the finished article. Congratulations Toni. CANADA- Lake Huron Sybil Mercer.

The large blue butterfly is Russian Punched on fabric, using very fine yarn that I purchased in New Zealand. I have been punching for about 10 years after 30 years of hooking caused my neck much grief. The motif is finished with a hand sewn edge and then applied to a black pillow.

Photo #2 is of a Magnificent Sunset about 5 p.m. on Dec 15, 2018 from our house.

We don't have this view very often. It is worked with cotton thread, and fine wool



"A very good friend of mine called Donella McKenzie has a cousin, Ena Campbell, in her eighties, who after seeing one of my rugs asked if I would like to have her collection of Harris tweed garns and wool left over from clothes she had made for herself and family. This lovely lady has lived all her life on the west coast of Scotland in a place called Rhue. I felt very honored to receive the materials, and about the same time, Donella gave me her dad's favorite Harris Tweed jacket. He had been a war veteran.

"So the inspiration came for me to hook Donella and her husband a floor rug. I thought I would do it in an abstract manner that would conjure up what Harris and the West Coast means—its ruggedness, hills, heathers, rivers, rocks, sea, isolation, open spaces, tranquility. All these locally made materials are the life blood of the island. I did not use any other materials in this rug other than these, including her dad's jacket. Initially I just drew a few random meandering lines, starting in the middle. It was lovely seeing this rug evolve out of feelings and thoughts, and I know how much it means to my friend?


TIGHR Conference October 2018

'DOING WHAT WE CAN' . By The Myrtles.



CANADA. NEWFOUNDLAND, St Johns Dianne Warren.








The first image is the Swaledale sheep rug that came from one of the workshops in Reeth.








QUEENSLAND - Mt Tamborine Bec Anderson

Title: "Sew Local Sweat Shop" **Project Summary**

"Sew Local Sweat Shop" is a public art event which actively engages the community to sew shopping bags in a factory production line setting. The performance will take place in a vacant shopfront and will provide educational and community building opportunities to the participants and audience.

Project Benefits As most of my community projects do "Sew Local Sweat Shop" casts a wide net in terms of its impact, particularly to the participants and audience. It provides the opportunity to engage passers-by to inspire and uplift, to educate and share and commune. It will inform sustainability and teach sewing skills to new people and to top it all off, it will produce hand sewn shopping bags as a by-product.

"Sew Local Sweat Shop" seeks to educate the community about a whole series of current issues as well as the skills required to create the bags:

- Slow Fashion vs Fast Fashion
- Overuse of plastics in the Environment
- Cutting, sewing overlocking and printing.
- Upcycling Fabric into useful shopping bags
- General Waste not Want not education

Social Engagement

"Sew Local Sweat Shop" will be promoted within the local community as a free event. It will also be promoted as a performance to attend. Local Business will provide the platform to promote the sewing event and to gather donated fabrics. The fabric gathering period allows for the promotion of the sewing event/performance.

Local Community Groups and schools will be encouraged to join in.

This project will bring those who know how to sew together with those who do not, providing a strong connection. It is hoped that all ages of the community will be blended into one cohesive production line with a mission to make bags.

Participants and Audience members will be a part of the making of community memories, as well as learning new skills and creating new friends.

Location: Shop 18 Flame Tree Plaza, Main Western Road Tamborine Mountain.

"Sew Local Sweat Shop" has been offered a vacant shop at #18 Flame Tree Plaza next to "El Burro" this space was once a bead shop and then a shoe shop. It is a combined gift of a mysterious and generous

landlord in conjunction with Michael from Tamborine Mountain Pizza. The project aims to revitalize this empty space temporarily to create community memories and stories.

Timeline

February 15th 10.30 am Official Launch at TM Library.

March 4th Installation and space prep with dry run

March 5 - 10 Sewing Production Line interactive Performance

March 11th Bag Distribution.

How can I get involved?

- Come to the library for the official launch on Friday the 15th of Feb at 10.30am, check out the prototype bags, see a demo of how to make them and sign up for a sewing session in March.
- We will need, cutters, sewers, Overlockers, tea makers, ironers, logo printers.
- Fabric donations medium weight min width 115cm clean can be left at Tamborine Mountain Library or with Jodie at Florence and Frida.
- Donations of good quality grey/beige or neutral sewing machine and overlocker thread, also required.
- If you wish to sew a bag for yourself you will need to provide 1 m of min width 115 wide medium weight fabric, which will make 2 bags one for the project and one for you to keep. Bring this with you to one of the sewing sessions and add it to the work pile for the day.
- Unique pre-stamped Bush Turkey Facings, handles and hooks provided.
- Sewing instructions and support provided.
- You may wish to collect facings and patterns and do some take away sewing.
