

Here is the second Sutherland Mash-up I have designed. I repurposed an old Rittermere Hurst Field design called Parquet. Unfortunately the studio is no longer in business. This is a real shame as the designs from this studio were amazing. I had the pattern, on burlap (or hessian as you call it) for years and I knew that I'd never hook it as my tastes in

that style of hooking had changed. So, instead I decided to honour it by adding something to it. One of my late husband's favourite sayings was "Life is not a dress rehearsal." Before I designed my own word art I searched on Etsy to see if there was something I could buy. I found word art by Eclectic Digital design that I purchased (price was less than \$10 Canadian). I then enlarged it to the size I wanted, printed it, transferred it



then enlarged it to the size I wanted, printed it, transferred it to the pattern and hooked the reimagined piece. This was a very satisfying piece to hook as I thought about my husband a lot during the pulling of loops. I like how the dark teal colour works with all the yellows and gold I used for this piece. It was challenging at times as I had forgotten to take a photo of the pattern before I hooked it. Sometimes it was hard to see where the geometric design stopped and started with the words on top. I am sending you two photos, one shows my label on the back. Most of the background colour was from a wonderful gold plaid, specifically milled for Martina Lesar's rug hooking studio, a wonderful Canadian source of supplies. hugs, Susan

A Secret Mat for a very Special Place

In 2017 my Cousins moved from Tring (a small town in Hertforshire, U.K.) to a property on the North Western shore of mainland Orkney, Scotland.

As a wandering 29 year old I had experienced an unforgettable holiday on Orkney that changed my life ...that's 36 years ago! So a visit to see their new home was planned. I went last June (2018) in the company of my Aussie friend from the Adelaide Hills.

Whilst there we were taken to see "Betty's Reading Room " - a restored Bothy dedicated to the memory of a late and much loved Special Needs teacher , Betty Prictor.

It is FULL of books , comfortable sofas and chairs , bits of art , bowls of biscuits (for people and dogs) ...the ideal place to lose yourself in a story , or to sketch , or just to think in peaceful surroundings.

There's a wood burner and the place is lit by old gas lights and strings of battery operated fairy lights . (I live "off grid " and use exactly the same Pyrex globes and gas mantles ..so it struck a chord with me)

Only one thing seemed to be missing ... these slate flagstones could do with a RAG RUG !

The piece came together fairly quickly after taking many months thinking about a design .

For the previous few years I've struggled to create hooked work ..putting it aside and concentrating instead on coiled rag vessels , 2D things and accessible art. But this Surprise mat for Betty's changed all that ...maybe I need to be GIVING my pieces to specific places/people rather than exhibiting for money ???

The Mat is approx 6' x 2' and should fit between the two main sofas. I measured the space with my feet .

Hares are a feature of the Orkney Islands and can be glimpsed all over the place.

Corncrakes are VERY audibll .but rarely seen . So there is an invisible Corncrake in the mat (LOL)

The green O stands for Orkney

Viking Runic symbols for "Legacy/ Home " "Gift " "Happiness " " Joy " and the letters spelling out Betty all blend with a background that represents the grey stormy seas and glittering light.

Normally I turn in a tiny hem and whip it ..but I felt that putting a wide hessian hem onto the reverse might act as both a support for the edges and a place to write some information for the curious .

A friend of mine from the nearest village here in Cumbria (Burneside, 5 miles outside Kendal) is going up to Orkney soon - she stays at a place only a few miles from my Cousins, so will drop it off with them for final delivery to Betty's beautiful book sanctuary. I've asked them to photograph it in it's new home.

While I have been putting this newsletter together Jennifer finished her wall hanging. Congratulations Jennifer

I know felt is expensive but I didn't pay for it. Years ago a dear friend gave me heaps of really good quality felt, I made many toys for Elizabeth including the snakes n ladders bedspread. I still have lots left and it's perfect for petals. I also used some suede for petals, non of my other fabrics were appropriate.

I used lots of materials in the hooky work of the wall hanging; polyester, wool/cotton yarns, cotton, silk, bits of a couple of t-shirts and a light blue satin dress.

Fraying - I'm not a fan. A couple of the flowers have shot silk centers, witch fray and I'm happy with them but, I found that doing a larger area was horrid - I'd catch a fray that would pull out work and it drove me bananas. So, I cut strips, machine sewed and pulled inside out then used dadah!! much better, time consuming but worth it.
