I am happy to let you know about our recent Rug Makers Guild Stall experience at the Sydney Craft and Quilt Fair in June. It was a resounding success and I couldn't have done it without support. Thanks to Jo Franco for organising the Guild funding for this event, and thanks to my group members who attended each day to answer enquiries and demonstrate the craft.

We had 164 people give their contact details (total last year was 42) and the Fair Organisers have invited (ie free of charge) us back next year to have a large display area and a workshop!! This is such a great encouragement for Rug Hooking crafters, and will inevitably mean the creation of more groups like the one I have started in Epping.

I am currently organising training in areas in an around Sydney, to manage the demand we now have for classes, and it may mean our numbers will grow over time too. I might need a bigger meeting space at



Epping, but that is still a bit far off.As a bonus, I will be running a class at The Happenstore in Annandale later this year https://www.thehappenstore.com They charge a fee but provide refreshments and the venue, as well as advertising the class. They get an enormous response to everything they run, so I will be reaching a wider audience. My aim is to teach in areas in and around the Sydney Metropolis and start groups in other areas that can be self-supporting to some extent.

by Australian bass fish.

This "punny" piece gives the viewer another opportunity to see and hear how words can convey interesting visual imagery. "Bass" is just one of the English words that has a different meaning depending on its pronunciation and context. (Called a Heteronym for those who want to know!).

In this piece, the visual pieces don't make sense until you realise that the lowest note in a chord – the bass note – could indeed be edible if it was a bass fish.

An authentic ice-fishing pole is mounted on stretched canvas covered with brocade fabric and surrounded by starched repurposed, hand-crocheted doilies. A "fishing line" of black wool yarn runs through the reel through the two notes on the Bass Clef to connect (via the fishing lure) the lowest (or bass) note of the chord - represented

we want to impose a rational explanation onto a work, but abstract art fights this and it makes our brains work in a different, harder way at a subconscious level.We

may not say it out loud but this is probably why people tend to find abstract art more intimidating, and quick to dismiss it. All this abstraction means our brains must suddenly function in a different, less comfortable, more puzzled way.

that being said, what do you make of this piece?

"Glenda the Latchkey Dragon"



"Glenda" is a house dragon and has her own key (so she doesn't disturb the family) to come and go as she pleases. Her "dragon flap" door sits on timber threshold

where Glenda regularly deposits the "treasures" she finds when she is out and about.

Glenda's

collection of sparkly, bright treasures include: a piece of crystal Labradorite; several glow-in-the-dark stones (they glow softly in the dark – after exposure to even indirect light – and serve to help Glenda find her

doorway – her night vision isn't so good); volcanic stone; a fossil shell and seashell; brass dragon bookmark with globe; seed pod; and several jars of small beads.

CANADA. -New Brunswick -Mary Alexander,


Good Morning Miriam,


