This is a LibbyLuLa twining frame. I like the idea of this frame because it is another avenue for making rag rugs using readily available materials (op shops are a great source of colourful quilt covers). The weaving principles are the same as tapestry weaving (which is usually done with fine yarns) but much easier to handle and therefore much quicker to work. I'm about to investigate some more intricate designs, now that I have a book to guide me - so much easier than utube! Judy.

one, and flowers in the other were done with blue dyed fur, and the stems in both were made from the long white moose hair bundles couched down. I am hoping to take a second class in September, but this time try my luck with an animal, possibly a lynx or moose. Two of my rug hooking friends are booked for the class which is at the other end of the island, a 9-hour drive. We are looking forward to the class very much.

Our instructor, Duncan Chisholm learned this craft/art when he was stationed in the far North (Canada) as an RCMP officer. He still gets most of his fur from that region, as it is finer than the moose we have on our island. He uses it mostly in its natural colour, but dyes some. The class is 3 days long, so that by time the class is over you leave with a matted and framed piece of art. The backing is black cotton velveteen and cotton denim, so two layers to give you a strong base. You need a good needle and strong thread or dental floss, and a small, sharp pair of scissors. A tuft of fur is cut from the hide and sewn to the backing, pulled and knotted very tightly so that it sort of pops up to make a solid mass. Once secured, you can use scissors to shape the fur. There are a number of techniques involved, and the colours and textures can be carefully chosen and positioned for different effects. Long white fur pieces can be bundled and couched down to form outlines for trees, hills, etc. It is slow work, but the finished piece is beautiful.

I managed to work quickly when I took that first class, and tufted both pieces in the three days. The butterfly in








Maree made this wrap for the organization



Cynthia Nicklin – one of Miriam Miller's former students – paid a visit to Judi Tompkins' home on Friday during a meeting with the Sunshine Rugcrafters in Landsborough. Cynthia works in isolation on her property at Mt. Glorious, a small village in the heart of rainforest situated in the D'Aguilar Range north west of Brisbane City. The main National Park area is Maiala that means 'quiet place' in the dialect of the original aboriginal Kamilaroi people.

Cynthia works "quietly away" hooking rugs and knitting.

It was Cynthia's involvement with a knitting group that prompted her visit to the Sunshine Coast Rugcrafters because she brought the group BAGS of left-over and unwanted knitting yarns and supplies from her group. Like rugmakers, knitters also are given far more "stuff" than they could ever use and work hard to "pass it on" to other groups who can use it.

When I knew Cynthia would be visiting I asked her to please bring some of her rugs and in particular I wanted the group to see her entry – *Mother Tree* (I'm not sure this is the correct title for this rug – I forgot to ask her!) in the "Re-imagined" online, virtual exhibition. The rug is very large and incorporates a

number of rugmaking techniques. Cynthia also brought several other brightly hooked rugs but her large knitted circle rug prompted a lot of investigation by the knitters and crocheters in the group!

We had a great time with Cynthia and there was a good exchange of ideas during her visit and we hope she'll come back to "Studio Palimpsest" again! Many thanks Cynthia for your generous gift of knitting supplies and materials....we'll continue to share them about!

There was lots of learning, fun and visiting during a full calendar of



events. One we all look forward to is seeing members' rugs displayed. These were the two that I took:

A Rose from my Garden

I initially tried doing this pillow in a fine cut (#3), but couldn't remember the technique after a time away from it, and found it very exacting. I began again in a #4 and 5 cut, and enjoyed it more. Though it isn't evident in the picture, in the outer row of hooking I interspersed the various colours of pink, which emphasized the borders. My teacher was Lynn Howard.

'Melancholy' by Jane McGown Flynn (adapted).

I purchased this pattern at last year's rug school, and thought it would be an interesting, quick project after I finished my pillow. It

seemed in the Art Nouveau style, which has always appealed to me. However, the shoulder was too large, so my husband redrew that for me. I couldn't come up with a satisfactory colour plan for the background, which curved up and down, so I ended up with a straight line, however, trying for an ombre effect from the top and bottom. I made the darker part of the poppy sculptural. When I was hooking the hair, I decided to leave the strands uncut and kind of liked the effect. For the cheek, there was a progression of slight height where I hoped the cheek bone would be.



The designer had titled it 'Melancholy'; I don't really think I captured that mood, but I still like the result.


