## CANADA – NOVA SCOTIA Cathy Komourdjian Hi Miriam

This idea is from the Book about Finishing mats, from Rug Hooking Magazine

I like to do three whippings of wool gives some mats real structure, and I love the way they look... I finish the hooking then start with 5mm cord tight up against the last hooked row, then I whip around the mat. Next row 7mm cord and I put it up against the cord I just whipped.then proceed to whip it for the 2nd time...Then I see how much background I need to get a third rolled edge into 2nd whipping.

Once I determine the amount of background required, I take my sewing machine and zigzag and curve my corners.ie make sure I do not have too much material to corner properly. Then I roll the background tightly in toward the 2nd whip and secure it and start whipping for the third time (I usually sew this down so my osteoarthritis is kept happy ..

I have been buying my cord at our Dollarama....but rug shops sell it as well

## Networking: by Jo Franco, Australian Rugmakers Guild Editor/Membership Chair

Sometimes members of the Guild ask ..... "why do we have a Guild?"

Well, apart from the obvious answer ...... we are trying to promote the craft of rug making in Australia - it also gives us a way of connecting with rughookers around Australia. It is particularly important for those in regional areas who do not belong to a group and would like someone to talk to about their rug hooking, to find out where to source supplies or just share suggestions about items they've found that are a good substitute for things we see in magazines available from overseas rug hooking suppliers.

Some of the members use Facebook where much of this information is shared both as a public post or in a private message.

Shelley Pinnell who lives in country WA and has no one close by to talk to about rug hooking!

Shelley and I chat on Facebook private messenger and I'm sharing a recent chat here as I know she would be interested to be in contact with others.

Shelley works on a lap frame with grippers and is finding the dimension of the frame a bit small, but says she likes it because it fits easily in her lap.

I'm surprized it's working for her, my experience with grippers and yarn isn't good 😕

Shelley uses an Oxford punch needle which she finds helpful, as she suffers with arthritis in her hands and shoulders, so not having to manipulate the yarn with her left hand, saves her from a painful right hand and left shoulder. Shelley reminded me you can use fabric strips with the larger sizes punch needle. At present she prefers yarn as she also weaves and has quite a big stash of rug wool.

Shelley says: I'm trying a different fabric for the base with my punch needle hook - it's an even-weave "coated" furnishing fabric I found in Spotlight. I did a trial and it seemed to work. I checked it out using my Irish hook, and it also worked perfectly with this backing fabric, I think because the coating is paper-like rather than plastic, and the thread count isn't small.

Thought I'd share a photo of my rug in progress. I'm using acrylic variegated yarn (I would prefer to use rug wool but I like this colour). It's interesting how the variegated yarn has formed stripes and because I've punched in 'blocks', it does have a subtle block-like look on the right side. Next time I might try using irregularly punched lines of different length, to see if the colours blend more evenly.

Have you or your group used variegated yarn over large areas before?




Shelley's punch needle rug, made with wool yarn. Views .back and front.
