



Recipe to try. A must.

BROWNIES.

100gm Plain chocolate, 125gm butter softened, 275 gm sugar, 1 teaspoon vanilla essence, 2 large eggs, lightly beaten, 85 gm plain flour, 2 tablespoons cocoa powder, 100gm walnut pieces, 50gm plain chocolate roughly chopped or choc chips.

A brownie tin 20.5 x 25.5 cm greased and lined. Preheat the oven to 180C (350F). Melt the 100gm chocolate in a bowl over a pan of steaming water. Leave to cool until needed.

Beat butter in a large mixing bowl until soft and creamy, add sugar and vanilla, and continue beating until soft and fluffy. Gradually beat in the eggs, and then the melted chocolate. Stir in the sifted cocoa and flour. Add the nuts, and chocolate pieces Stir in. Put the mixture in prepared tin, and spread evenly.

Bake in preheated oven for 30 minutes until a skewer inserted comes out just clean (I found I had to cook longer) Leave to cool until just warm, remove from tin and cut into twenty pieces. Store in an airtight container and eat withing 5 days. (I did freeze mine, and it was just as good when thawed))


NEW SOUTH WALES – Milton – Miriam
