

HINT FOR CLEANING SILVER. - Place cutlery to be cleaned in a bowl or similar. Add some bicarb-soda, like a good tablespoon, then crumple some alfoil (silver foil) about a 15cm length, place with the cutlery, pour over boiling water, and like magic the silver is shining again. Rinse. Quantities depend on amount of silver to be cleaned. Not sure if it is good for the silver, but it is good for the cleaner. Miriam

It was good to receive your newsletter and see how other rug hookers around the world are coping with isolation.

Here in Guernsey we have lock down, only essential workers allowed out and about, and everyone else, only to shop for food, medicines and go for exercise either walking or cycling, a bit too cold still for a dip in the sea!

All shops and businesses shut, except for essential, hence we have no tourists!

No passenger ferries from anywhere only freight boats, and only 2 flights over to the mainland daily, and then people have to go into self-isolation for 2 weeks.

We have 91 cases tested positive, but only one person needing hospitalisation at the moment Unfortunately one of the care homes has 27 people testing positive, that is patients and staff. So, this is needing special management.

We are all doing lots of knitting, gardening and rug hooking and the children are doing school lessons on line. Where would we be without modern technology.

Stay in and stay safe, is the call for the moment, so our best wishes to you and your family.

Before the fires started, I began a new rug on a very long frame. It's based on a photo I took last year, an abstracted view of the scenery from the driveway into our property. I'm calling it The Road Home. The rug was put on hold for 3 months as I fought fires at home and away. I came back to it as the bush around us was starting to recover. That has been a saving grace in current times. As the COVID-19 pandemic spread and worsened and the rug progressed I watched more and more life restoring itself in the burnt bush around us. It's given me hope for the future. I'm now into the final quarter of the rug. I'm sending 2 photos to show some of its progress. It's a large rug, landscape orientation 170 cm in width. I've appreciated being able to have the full width in view on the stretcher frame as I've worked from top to bottom.

The fires and their aftermath have given me a rich source of images for future rugs, more than a lifetime's worth! And now the pandemic has given time to get some of this work done. Unfortunately, I'm not visiting op shops these days, but I think my stash will hold out for at least a few months. People like us are lucky that we can use this stay at home period creatively. There will be so much to share once we finally get together again.

I am not impressed with how slow the government was to react, and the lack of PPE for health workers. We are all doing our best to stay in so that the number of new cases starts to decrease.

We have a WhatsApp group in the street so that anyone who needs helps can just ask. One good thing to come out of this is that we know our neighbours better - we are lucky that everyone seems to be supportive.

Added 29th April

Our government has not handled the virus well at all - it is shocking. Over 15,000 people a day arrive in the country at the airports and there is no testing or quarantine. Makes us nervous about when they say that we can relax the restrictions as the virus will still be in the community. So, we are being very cautious.

There are lots of local Facebook groups of sewers who are making scrubs, face masks, scrub hats and other kit for doctors and nurses and care workers. I have joined one and I hope to get started later today. In East Sussex where we live, the group has made over 4,000 items!



AMERICA- California – Gene Shepherd.

It has been a very strange Spring for rug hookers in S. California as well as throughout the world. March kicked off the cancellation tsunami, beginning with my 20th and last year of Cambria Pines Rug Camp in June, all rug hooking events in S. California, and then the trip I was leading for 36 fibre artists to England, Wales and Scotland in June and July. While cancelling that was bad enough on its own, the final blow was most severe since Heather Ritchie had planned to join us for a couple of days while in York. Locals who are used to coming to my studio 3 or 4 times a month, now join me weekly for a Zoom session. That is better than nothing. Since restaurants, which are deemed essential services, can have curb side pickup for phoned in orders, I have instituted a curb side pickup in my driveway for phoned in orders of essential wool. After I place the ordered wool on a plastic table in the drive way, I sit masked about 12 feet away until the customer stops in the street, runs for the wool and then goes. The other day I had to also have an essential curb side Beeline cutter equipped with a #10 blade! I am sure this will be our situation for the next several months. While some hooking events are still scheduled for the fall, no one is holding their breath. In our discussions, we do think and talk about our rug hooking friends around the world. I certainly keep all of you in my thoughts and prayers. Gene Shepherd

Some of many beanies knitted by Ilka during this time of isolation. Some are for the homeless and others to go in gift boxes our local spinning group are putting together for bush fire victims.

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



For 6 days straight now, Newfoundland has had no new cases of Covid-19. We have geographical space on our side here as we have a small population in a big land.
