Koala News. Since the bushfires it has been in the news about the plight of Koalas. Their habitat is being destroyed by clearing for housing and lately the bushfires. I wrote to a Koala Protection Society about trees we can plant to help. And I am printing their replies to my emails.

I thought this may interest some people, and you can check out the lists of trees suitable in your area, below. (click on the first website)

Hi Miriam,

I could send you a list of the preferred koala food trees for Ipswich but, as you've rightly guessed, these are quite different to those eaten even by koalas on the coast like Redlands and Brisbane or elsewhere.

As koalas inherit from their mothers all the gut flora that actually digest the leaves, these organisms are change from location to location, meaning some translocated koalas can even have difficulty eating the trees in a new location.

There are extensive lists available of food tree species, attached is one I found for NSW (<u>https://www.epa.nsw.gov.au/-/media/epa/corporate-site/resources/pnf/07361koalahabitat.pdf</u>)

It is complicated! But thank you for being interested and passing the information on. It is people like you taking the time which will make the difference and ensure we keep our koalas and their habitat into the future. Planting the right trees really works and you do not have to wait decades for koalas to move in and use them, if you are connected to existing habitat where there are already large trees they can use as shelter.

IKPS planted 100s of trees 10 years ago on the property where our clinic is located, neighbouring mature ironbarks with resident koalas. Last year during the terrible drought three mothers with joeys and several males moved in and out many times to browse on the young trees. It was fantastic and we believe helped sustain these koalas through the months of dry.

So all the best - and let's plant trees! Kind Regards


These are my efforts. On the left, is the smallest at about 2" X 3". It is Fall Colours from my Kitchen Window. The right one is 5" X 7". It is the present day site of The Brickyard near Kenmare, North Dakota, USA. Both my great-grandparents worked here before his untimely death in 1910. If you look hard, you will see two trees just off centre above the pond to commemorate them.

The miniatures were exciting to do as you could finish them more quickly. I learned that it would be best to have a strong focal point, preferably with a curving road or river leading up to it. Another point was that what is listed as a 5" X 7" mat is really $4 \frac{1}{2}$ " X 6".




NEW SOUTH WALES Eden – Miriam



Yvonne (below) is creating a series of wall panels with a variety of fabrics and mixed techniques including punch needle work proggy and couching.




