
CANADA – ONTARIO.

Show us one of your rugs!


Why is rug hooking important to you and what's the best thing about it in your opinion.

CANADA – New Brunswick. Mary Alexander.



RECIPE

BROWNIES.

Ingredients

100g chocolate,125g butter

275g sugar

1 teasp. vanilla essence

2 large eggs

85g plain flour

2 tablespoons cocoa powder

120g pecan or walnut pieces of halves

50g chocolate roughly chopped

A tin 20.5 x 25.5cm greased base lined.

Transfer mixture to prepared tin and spread evenly. Bake in preheated oven for about 30 35 minutes until a skewer comes out just clean. Remove from oven, leave to cool until just warm before removing from tin and cut into 20 pieces. Best eaten warm. Once cold can be stored in an airtight tin but eat within 5 days. Otherwise Freezes well.



Preheat oven to 180C (350F)

Break the 100g chocolate into a heatproof bowl. Set the bowl over a pan of steaming water and melt the chocolate gently. Leave until needed. Put the butter into a bowl, beat until creamy Add sugar and vanilla continue beating until fluffy, gradually beat in the eggs and the melted chocolate. Sift flour and cocoa into the mixture and stir in. Then add Nuts and chopped chocolate.
