This is most recent 'abstract' rug, about 50x60cm made from wool sock offcuts.






This is another underway with Ilka's online course of braided rug making. It's interesting as the fabric supports itself so it's lighter n easy to wash n wear in the washing machine

Cursing him again, the desperate Taliban staggered away, over the hill.


Several hours later, he crawled back, almost dead, and gasped, "They won't let me in without a mask"

Happily, I am finally back to regular multi-day classes in my studio. However, in my free time, I've also been working on a slightly different project that allows me to use up my stash of wool that's not really suited to regular hooking.



Although I've both hooked rugs and prodded rugs with my wool selvedges for many years, it's become apparent that I will never be able to use them up if limited to just those two methods. Consequently, I've been taking the time to sew them together so that I can weave them as a rag rug. Since all my wool was boiled when I dyed it, then dried in a hot dryer, these rugs are quite sturdy and even able to be washed in cold water if needed. While I hate taking the time to sew those short pieces together, I like having a quicker way to use them up and I very much like the way they look when woven. Of course, the biggest benefit is finding a way to translate all that wool into a useable form.

Here is my mosaic Pine Tree completed February 5, 2022. The pattern is from Sue Perry who taught the 2-day class (mosaics/ stained glass) through the Ontario Hooking Craft Guild but all of the colour planning was done by me. Any class sponsored by OHCG is top notch-excellent teachers, interesting subjects, and small class size so everyone feels like they are getting individual attention - all on ZOOM.

The pine tree is hooked on linen foundation with 100 percent wool strips all from my stash. I used cuts 4-5. The piece measures 15 inches by 17 1/2 inches.

NEW SOUTH WALES – Milton - Felted iPad Carry Bag. By Vivien Davidson.



I made this bag for my sister living in Indiana. It is nuno- felted with a base of fabric cut from a silk scarf that I had hand-dyed in similar colours some years earlier. It has layers of merino roving over it, and the design cut from fine merino "pre-felt" and silk "paper" that I had made myself and I felted on some thick pure wool yarn to make the vine stems. The design is based on the heart shaped leaves of the Woolly Pipe Vine of the USA mid-west.

After the initial stages of wet felting, instead of rolling it, I removed any excess water, covered it with a layer of translucent plastic laminate, the kind that is used in protective packaging for parcels, but thinner than is used for carpet underlay. Then I used an orbital sander to felt it to the stage of being ready for final fulling. The sander works really well as it limits the movement of the fabric, so the design is not disturbed in the felting process and the vibrations do the job without any hard physical effort from the felter! Yay!! I love my sander! Of course, you have to be very careful not to have any water around electrical equipment so I have my own safety rules for its use. The sander must also be a flat plate type, not Velcro attaching sanding sheets. You don't use sand paper! Just the vibrations if the machine is all you need and it doesn't damage your work. (Read about them on Pinterest)

Making silk paper is also a way to guarantee that your layer of silk embellishment stays where you want it, and also is much easier to handle, not sticking to your fingers or flying away! The instructions come from Chrissie Lauritz, of Fibre Fusion. So, check out the website: Vivien

Yesterday I got caught up in a Textile Mixed Media project. Couldn't put it down, so what I thought would be a quick morning project turned into me completely losing track of time and having to stop myself the next day from adding embellishments! I had taken a Kandinsky inspired Textile Art Class at Saadiyat Al Manarat in Abu Dhabi. It's a huge art/theatre exhibition centre with Art Studio with resident artists. Our Teacher, Hanneke Reinalde is an award-winning international textile artist. We painted cotton fabric and cut out shapes. Not sure where those 3 hours went. The following day I felt inspired to turn it into a book cover. Set about painting more cotton fabric with intense blocks - using what I have, I don't need any more craft supplies!!! Cut out more shapes, taking out the tertiary colours and going with just primaries, embroidered and free hand machined the fabric. Finishing off my hand sewing the book cover flaps.

Added extra cotton fabric and painted using Intense blocks, took out tertiary colours and went with primaries instead. Machine embroidered and free motion quilted
