



#### WESTERN AUSTRALIA – Wink Lindsay

I enjoy watching the various butterflies that visit my garden. My Buddleia hedge is a favourite of the Monarch butterflies in spring and they enjoy the zinnias in my vegie patch during the summer months. One morning, I found a dead butterfly in my garden and had the idea of making a handbag. Just for fun I made it in the shape of the butterfly, with the two sides hooked to show the different upper and lower wing patterns.

The bag can be held as a large clutch or worn as a shoulder bag, with the finished size being 53cm across and 22cm deep. I used an internal flex purse frame with small D rings for attaching the leather shoulder strap and hand sewed it in with the lining, so the bag closes almost seamlessly at the top. As with all my rug hooked pieces, I use a variety of fabrics (t-shirts, dresses, scarves, sari silk) and yarns, most are found in thrift shops. I keep an eye out when looking for particular colours, and in this case, orange is quite a challenge to find. I hooked the bag as one piece, so I could fold it at the base and reduce the amount of edge sewing needed. I like hooking my projects but the sewing up part is not as much fun! I am really pleased with how both sides look and that the bag is just how I envisaged. Functional and Beautiful.
