Last year, the Altenburg Gallery in Braidwood invited artists working in various genres to participate in their Christmas exhibition. We had to use 2 wood blocks - all the same size, purchased from the gallery, on which to create our pieces. I hooked my rugged pieces, being careful to make them exactly the right size, then glued them to the wood blocks.

As every artwork in the show was the same size, it made hanging the pieces very simple but the diversity of the work was amazing. It was interesting to see how those who normally use other display means, such as embroiderers and sculptors, rose to the challenge of using flat surface bocks.

Title: Profusion Dimensions: 200cm x 86cm Year: 2023 Medium: hooked recycled fabric and wool on polyester netting ('costume netting ')

Statement:

Offering two contrasting views, this hooked and looped work captures a moment of reflection in the cycle of destruction and growth we are experiencing in rural Australia. The rains that followed the Black Summer fires sprouted a profusion of grasses and reeds, with a richness and diversity of fibres to touch an artist's heart.

This work was made with a hook and loop process on a piece of 'costume netting', a strong open netting I found at Spotlight and decided to see what I could do with it.




AUSTRALIA – NEW SOUTH WALES. – MILTON – Vivien Davidson


Pigeonhouse/Didthul Mountain is the major landmark of the Southern Shoalhaven and I love to walk out my front door and watch every mood of this mountain especially as the sun sets in the West behind it. We all perceive it through our own cultural lens, To the Yuin nation, the name Didthul translates as "woman's breast " and it is a deeply spiritual place, while Capt Cook, who saw it from out at sea, was reminded of the large stone and dome roofed pigeon houses of his homeland, England. I have given an echo of the indigenous perception in the clouds and the outline of Cooks "pigeon houses" with pigeons in the foreground.

it is a combination of wet felted merino wool pieces (plus some dry felted embellishment,) nuno felted silk, painted woven cotton fabric, and it is all covered in fine tulle. It is both machine and hand-stitched using some quilting and machine embroidery techniques. Viv

CANADA -NEWFOUNDLAND Dianne Warren




This past winter I needed an easy-to-pack project. The stars aligned and I found wool for something I had wanted to play with since 2009. The first mat I did was with Pam Chase. Then I started searching for 3-2 ply wool to make more. This year, 14 years later, I started making these small mats, in a 4 to 6 inch range. A few are waiting for fringes.

The technique is Turkish knots on rug warp. The sides are whipped. Several of the designs are taken from motifs found in middle eastern rugs.







AUSTRALIA – SOUTH AUSTRALIA Strathalbyn Judy Stephens




